Americans and the Holocaust traveling exhibition coming to the Milwaukee Public Library with programming co-sponsored by the Holocaust Education Resource Center.

Milwaukee, Wis. — The Milwaukee Public Library is one of 50 U.S. libraries selected to host *Americans and the Holocaust*, a traveling exhibition from the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum that examines the motives, pressures and fears that shaped Americans' responses to Nazism, war and genocide in Europe during the 1930s and 1940s.

The touring library exhibition — based on the special exhibition of the same name at the Museum in Washington, D.C. — has traveled to U.S. libraries from 2021 to 2024. Milwaukee will be the last stop on the tour.

Based on extensive new research of that period, *Americans and the Holocaust* addresses important themes in American history, exploring the many factors — including the Great Depression, isolationism, xenophobia, racism and antisemitism — that influenced decisions made by the U.S. government, the news media, organizations and individuals as they responded to Nazism. This exhibition will challenge the commonly held assumptions that Americans knew little and did nothing about the Nazi persecution and murder of Jews as the Holocaust unfolded.

"MPL has a strong track record of winning grants from national arts and library organizations for their prestigious educational traveling exhibits highlighting many cultures, peoples and places," said Joan Johnson, Library Director. "We invite our patrons to explore this latest example and expand their understanding of historical events through the joint programming that is supplemental to the exhibit. We're grateful to work with the Nathan and Esther Pelz Holocaust Education Resource Center (HERC) on this critically important content for the programs."

Americans and the Holocaust will be on display at Milwaukee Central Library along with a series of related special events, from October 30, 2023 to January 5, 2024.

In addition, HERC is generously co-sponsoring and co-curating several learning opportunities for students and adults, from class field trips to panel discussions. In-person and virtual events are scheduled throughout November and December, with a special exhibit opening event on the evening of November 9th, featuring a guided tour, reception and keynote speaker, Dr. Daniel Greene. November 9 is also the 85th anniversary of Kristallnacht (Night of Broken Glass), and the program will commemorate this solemn event.

"Having toured this exhibition firsthand, I can honestly say experiencing it was one of the defining moments of my own understanding of the Holocaust. At its core, this exhibition is about wrestling with the unsettling questions 'What did Americans know as the Holocaust unfolded, and what more could have been done?' Such questions are essential for us to continue asking today." said Samantha Abramson, Executive Director, HERC.
